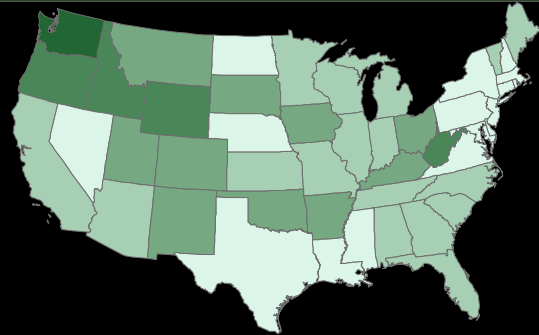


1) This most famous sighting is from a film shot in 1967 by Roger Patterson and Robert Gimlin. It allegedly shows an encounter in Northern California.
