

Although the United States has made many strides towards gender equality, the fight is far from over. The average pay gap between U.S. men and women for the same career is 23% and female polticial empowerment is below 20%. Ranking 28th globally for overall equality and 60th for political empowerment, the U.S. falls below many high and low income countries when it comes to women's life quality.

How are countries ranked?

Each country is given a numeric score based on four different life quality factors

1. Economic Participation & Opportunity: (25% of total) Ratio: female labour force participation over male value Ratio: Wage equality between women & men for similar work Ratio: female estimated earned income over male value Ratio:female legislators, senior officials & managers over male value Ratio: female professional & technical workers over male value

2. Education: (25% of total) Ratio: female literacy rate over male value Ratio: female net primary enrolment rate over male value Ratio: female net secondary enrolment rate over male value Ratio: female gross tertiary enrolment ratio over male value

3. Health & Survival: (25% of total) Sex ratio at birth (converted to female-over-male ratio) Ratio: female healthy life expectancy over male value



4. Political Empowerment: (25% of total) Ratio: # of years of a female head of state (last 50 yrs) over male value Ratio: femáles with seats in parliament over male value Ratio: females at ministerial level over male value

Best Place to Live: Iceland In 1980, Iceland became the first country to elect a female head of state. Since, it has become the home of progressive legislation such as 3 month paid paternal leave and laws that require companies to have a minimum 40% women or men on their boards. Childcare is also heavily subsided, allowing for women's participation in the labour market to be the highest in the world (88%).



No Country Has Reached Full Gender Equality: Even the top ten countries for women have a long way to go.
