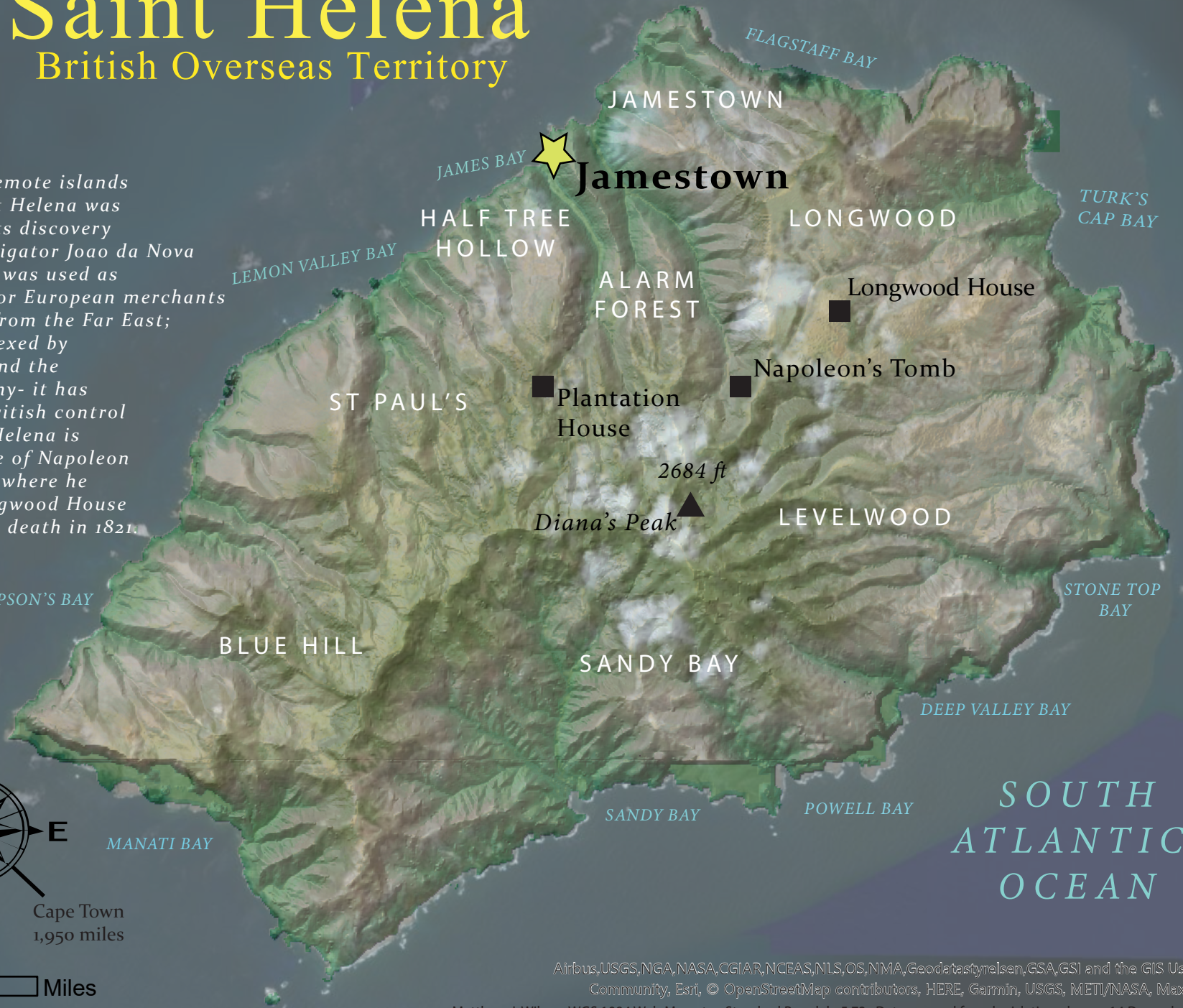




Saint Helena

British Overseas Territory

One of the most remote islands in the world, Saint Helena was uninhabited upon its discovery by Portuguese navigator Joao da Nova in 1502. The island was used as a stopping point for European merchants travelling to and from the Far East; in 1657 it was annexed by Oliver Cromwell and the East India Company- it has remained under British control ever since. Saint Helena is famously the place of Napoleon Bonaparte's exile, where he resided in the Longwood House from 1815 until his death in 1821.
